


Figure 1.4 Old leaders, young population

Africa has the youngest population globally but some of the world's oldest leaders. The median African leader at 62 years old is 8 years older than the median OECD bedeer. Futhermore, the age gap between the region's population and leaders is 42 years compared to only 12 for the OECD.



Members of Parliament under 40 years of age

The younger population is also not as well represented in African parliaments. On average, only 14 percent of the region's parliamentarians are younger than 40, which is below the world average. It should be expected to be much higher given that 70 percent of the region's population is under 30 years old.



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Top Challenges Facing Africa Today

Building the Generations of Our Dream...

- Africa is the world's second-largest and second most populous continent. It has the youngest amongst all and most vibrant brains and hosts a large diversity of ethnicities, cultures and languages.
- All of these features made the continent face the hardest challenges in the world.
- lyp entrepreneurship investment policy shall seek to strengthen the youths by removing all this identified impediments and ensuring that they have strong linkage with the productive sectors in all the African market to boost the continent economy

Poverty / ill Health

- Although the poverty rate in Africa is falling, rapid population growth means that the number of people suffering poverty keeps growing: Africa is the world"s last frontier in the fight against extreme poverty. Today, one in three Africans -422 million people – live below the global poverty line. They represent more than 70 percent of the world"s poorest people.
- HEALTH: Health outcomes are worse in Africa than anywhere else in the world, even though life expectancy at birth has risen and chronic malnutrition has declined since the mid- 1990s.

Violence

 VIOLENCE: Tolerance of Domestic violence is twice As high as in the rest of the Developing world. Incidents Of violence against civilians Are on the rise. While this litany of suffering is true throughout sub- Saharan Africa, with regard to all these measures life is particularly harsh for people living in the roughly 34% of African where states have collapsed to the point of irrelevance.

Hunger/ Access to financing

- **HUNGER:** Of the countries in the world with the worst food and nutrition security, 19 are in Africa.
- FINANCING: About 70 percent of Africans
 work in agriculture, but only 10% of the total
 portfolios of commercial banks goes to
 agriculture, according to the World Bank.
 Challenging legal and financial environments
 are constraining growth in African agriculture.
 For smallholders, especially, credit is often
 inaccessible or not affordable. Without
 appropriate financing, farmers are not only less
 able to invest in their operations but also much
 more vulnerable to market volatility and
 unpredictable weather.

Poor Education:

The World Bank Group published its flagship report: the World Development Report (WDR) 2018—Learning to Realize Education's Promise. The report is the firstever edition of the publication entirely dedicated to education. The 2018 WDR warns of a learning crisis in global education; after several years of schooling, millions of children are unable to read, write, and solve basic math problems. The crisis is more severe for vulnerable children—i.e., that affected by poverty, conflict, gender disparities, or disability—and has led to the widening of social gaps.





Figure 1: The percentage of primary school students who pass a minimum proficiency threshold is often lowProgress on these indicators is relatively slow. For instance, the report states that it could take 180 years for Tunisia to reach the OECD average for mathematics if the current pace of learning remains unchanged. The report finds that a high share of students complete primary school without the necessary mathematics and reading knowledge. There are regional differences within the continent too (Figure 2). The WDR cites a 2014 regional assessment showing that 58 percent of grade 6 students in West and Central Africa were not sufficiently proficient in reading, though students in East and Southern Africa perform slightly better, with only 37 percent not proficient. Contrastingly, the level of math proficiency is comparable in the two regions, 58 against 60 percent.

The report explains that low-income and developing countries are most affected by the global learning crisis. In low-income countries, less than 5 percent of students in late primary school score above the minimum proficiency level for reading. This figure lies at 14 percent for mathematics. In sub-Saharan Africa, less than 7 percent of students in late primary school are proficient in reading, against 14 percent in mathematics (Figure 1). For instance, when asked to read a sentence such as — The name of the dog is Puppy, three quarters of primary school students in Kenya, Tanzania, and Uganda were unable to understand it. Even students tested using local languages were still unable to comprehend given sentences. The report states that the lags in primary education will affect the children's preparedness for future job prospects, which are increasingly demanding in skills quality.

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

School attendance does not pose a problem in sub-Saharan Africa. Nevertheless, the learning gaps remain high. Many children are not well-equipped to learn due to illness, malnutrition, or income deprivation. The report also cites the lack of testing as a cause for poor educational achievements. The quality of teaching is poor, as some teachers are not particularly well-educated themselves.


Absenteeism of teachers is also a problem in sub-Saharan Africa. Figure 3 shows the absence of teachers from school overall and those from class. The classroom absence variable combines absences from school with absences from class among teachers who are at school. For instance, in Kenya, the gap between the two variables shows that 32 percent of teachers come into school without attending class. The report suggests that teacher absenteeism can be attributed to low salaries—teachers often have to take on secondary jobs to support themselves. Moreover, in addition to teaching, many teachers find themselves handling administrative tasks normally outside of their purview due to schools being short-staffed.

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In order to solve the learning crisis, the WDR provides three recommendations. First, countries should put strategies in place to create welldesigned student assessments and help teachers guide students toward achieving good learning outcomes. Second, countries should target the areas with the largest gaps between their learning environment and the tools that yield the best learning outcomes. Third, the report suggests aligning actors in order to make the whole system —work for learning.

What We Are Going To Do


lyp is focusing on the most underprivileged youth residing in urban slums, surviving on meager of resources and constantly seeking out a purpose for their life.




